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## **269 IUSM students to graduate Sunday**

The 2007 IUPUI Commencement ceremony will be held on the stadium floor of the Indiana Convention Center and RCA Dome on Sunday, May 13. The student procession will begin promptly at 2:30 pm followed by the ceremony at 3 p.m.

Immediately following the commencement, the 269 IUSM graduates will reconvene for a special ceremony to receive their diplomas and distinctive green hoods. Then, in unison, they will recite the Physician’s Oath – a pledge to the patients they will serve to uphold the standards of their profession.

While many will pursue at least part of their residencies within Indiana, 86 students will train at IU Hospital, Riley Hospital, other Clarian Health facilities, Wishard Health Services and the Roudebush VA Medical Center. Forty-one percent of the class will concentrate on primary care disciplines, which includes internal medicine, family medicine, pediatrics, obstetrics/gynecology, primary and combined internal medicine-pediatrics.

## **Students to receive disaster preparedness training**

On Thursday, May 17, and Friday, May 18, third-year medical students will be involved in a “first of its kind” Disaster Preparedness Training. The course is designed to provide students with information regarding a number of important topics not covered in the usual medical school curriculum. These topics include:

- Biological Agents
- Chemical Agents
- Radiation Agents
- Pandemic Influenza
- Decontamination of Patients
- Triage
- Table-top exercise (Pandemic Influenza)
- Ethical Issues related to Disasters
- Mental Health Issues related to Disasters
- Pediatric Issues Related to Disasters
- Self/Family Protection
- Media Relations

Given the recent disasters that have been in the news this decade (9/11/01, the Asian tsunami, Hurricane Katrina, etc), it is clear that society, and our physicians, in particular, must be better prepared for such events. The likelihood of a new influenza pandemic is another reason for this need for greater preparation.

The course is designed to give students opportunities to make decisions themselves in simulated disaster exercises. With the public awareness of a potential influenza pandemic and the multiple issues such a pandemic would raise for physicians (patient care, self-protection, family protection, personal protective equipment, prophylactic medications), that scenario will be emphasized in the course.

A unique component of this training is the Indianapolis Fire Department’s decontamination sessions to be held Thursday afternoon and Friday morning in parking lot #63. Students will learn first hand how to decontaminate someone in case of a chemical disaster.

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## This week on Sound Medicine

Tune in at 4 p.m. Sunday, May 13, to *Sound Medicine*, the weekly radio program co-produced by IUSM and WFYI Public Radio (90.1 FM) in Indianapolis. The program is hosted by Barb Lewis.

This week, Joyce Lee, MD, MPG, assistant professor of pediatric endocrinology at the University of Michigan, will discuss her study that suggests childhood obesity could cause puberty to arrive earlier in young girls.

The American Cancer Society is enrolling 500,000 individuals who never have been diagnosed with cancer and are willing to be closely watched for 20 or more years. The Cancer Prevention Study 3 will be discussed by Alpa Patel, the group's strategic director, who will explain the importance of such a large-scale research study and the impact it will have on cancer research.

Lead researcher Jesse Stewart, PhD, IUPUI assistant professor of psychology, will discuss the influence of negative emotions and the affect it has on cardiovascular health.

Science and health writer Eric Metcalf provides his commentary about hypochondria and how it managed to take over his life.

Crispus Attucks Medical Magnet High School in Indianapolis is gaining national attention and thus increasing its enrollment. The program encourages middle and high school students to pursue careers in some aspect of medicine. *Sound Medicine* reporter Sandy Roob talks with current students about why they are participating and what they hope to gain from the experience.

Ira Flatow is the host of *National Public Radio's* Talk of the Nation: Science Friday. He and his staff developed a new website designed to appeal to middle and high school students and their teachers to promote science.
