- Posters will be available for viewing from 6 p.m. June 25 until noon June 26. Presenters are not required to attend the entire event.
- Posters may be taken down starting at noon on June 26.
- Presenters may attend the conference at a discounted student rate of \$75.

The poster contest will have two categories – non-profit organization and for-profit organization. The winning poster presenters in each category will be announced during the luncheon on June 26 and awarded a cash prize of \$500.

Australian expert in pediatric epidemiology and bioethics to speak

Dr. Fiona Stanley, director of the Telethon Institute for Child Health Research in Perth, Western Australia, will be the first Audrey Pratt Visiting Lecturer in Pediatric Bioethics, and will be at IUSM June 13-15 to give lectures and meet with faculty and students.

She will present pediatric grand rounds from 8 to 9 a.m. Wednesday, June 13, in the Riley Outpatient Center auditorium. Her topic is "Population Data, Ethics and Pediatric Care: How we can use population data to guide ethical decision making."

As part of the Center for Bioethics program in Predictive Health Ethics Research (PredictER), Dr. Stanley will lecture from 3 to 4 p.m. Thursday, June 14, in the Health Information and Translational Sciences Building, room 1110, on "Data for a Civil Society: How we can harmonize privacy and use population data for public good."

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This week on Sound Medicine

Tune in at 4 p.m. Sunday, June 10, to *Sound Medicine*, the weekly radio program co-produced by IUSM and WFYI Public Radio (90.1 FM) in Indianapolis. The program is hosted by Barb Lewis. Co-hosts for this week's program are Ora Pescovitz, MD, and David Crabb, MD. On July 1, *Sound Medicine* will begin airing at 2 p.m. Sundays on WFYI following *Car Talk*.

This week, *Sound Medicine* will explore the sudden reappearance of rickets, a bone weakening disease affecting children deficient in vitamin D. Contributing reporter Lonny Shavelson discovers the reason for the increase and why one Oakland, Calif. physician has treated 59 patients suffering from rickets.

A growing number of doctors across Indiana are prescribing donated human milk to help premature and sick infants gain weight. The Indiana Mothers Milk Bank supplies this milk to those who cannot nurse their children. In part 2 of her series, *Sound Medicine* reporter Sandy Roob will share what she learned about how the milk is donated, collected and cleaned before it is dispensed.

Thirty million Americans wear contacts, some of which receive Lasik eye surgery for permanent correction. For individuals with extreme nearsightedness, Lasik surgery is not an option. Francis Price, MD, an ophthalmologist and CEO of Price Vision Group, will discuss his most recent research project examining the option of an implantable lens to improve vision for those patients who do not qualify for the Lasik surgery.

Paul Winchester, M.D., professor of clinical pediatrics at IUSM, will discuss how a common pesticide caused a decrease in fertility in mice.

A heart murmur is an extra or unusual sound during a heartbeat that often can indicate a heart problem. Physicians traditionally have found it quite difficult to recognize that sound with a stethoscope. A Temple University School of Medicine study shows that listening to heart sounds on an iPod can help doctors better recognize heart murmurs. Michael Barrett, M.D., clinical associate professor of medicine and a cardiologist at Temple University School of Medicine and Hospital, is the author of the study and talks about how helpful the iPod training has become when listening for a heart murmur.

National Public Radio reporter Richard Knox reports on an approach to help middle-school students understand the consequences of listening to loud music on their iPods and the imminent danger of damage to the inner ear.
